From our trip to Middle Fork Fish & Wildlife Preserve and Kickapoo State Park

ast weekend we took a discovery trip to Kickapoo State Park which is located just west of Danville, IL. It was a welcome surprise. The trip took only one hour and ten minutes from south Bloomington. We spent over three hours there and yet covered only half of the park.

This was once a large strip mining area that has slowly recovered to its natural state. The park encompasses over 2,600 acres and has approximately 12 ponds, some large and some small. The Vermillion River runs the length of the park. Four miles to the north is yet another park. It is the Middle Fork State Fish and Wildlife Area. A nice bonus.

Activities include canoeing, kayaking, fishing, and hiking. While not as spectacular as Starved Rock, the variety of water, wild life, and diversity may make it a superior photography venue.

The park can provide a very nice outing. Get there early and drive around to the various sights checking out the best photo opts. Then enjoy hiking, boating, and picnicking while waiting for the good light to take some photos. Be sure to pick up a map and also check it out on the internet.




















Photography Tips & Tricks

Photographing Fireworks

4th July and other Fireworks events attract most of the photographers. The fireworks are the most inspiring, beautiful and photogenic; at the same it is challenging; there are several opportunities to experiment with long exposures, flux muscle with your creativity. This is one of the cases where fully automatic mode may not be very helpful.



Your Location matters:

Make sure that you have clear and unobstructed view of fireworks. To obtain such a location, arrive early; however, don't choose too close to the place from where fireworks will be launched. The closer you are to fireworks launching area you need to aim upwards to capture the fireworks; you may need very wide angle lens to capture multiple bursts in one exposure. The other factor that would affect the exposure is downwind. Thinks to remember while obtain a good location don't become an obstruction/disturbance to people around you.

At these events following thing may be helpful to keep yourself comfortable -

- A bottle of water.
- Camping chair
- Insect repellent and
- A flash light

Also following camera gear -

- A wide angle lens preferable 24-70MM or 10-22 MM if you are planning to include surrounding area with the fireworks.
- A Telephoto lens ... my preference is 70-200 MM.. you may have different lens.
- A cable release or IR remote shutter release. This is required to minimize the camera shake.
- Use a combination of self-timer with shutter release.
- A solid tripod
- One or two fully changed batteries

Camera Settings:

Exposure modes

DON'T SETUP YOUR CAMERA EXPOSURE DIAL TO AUTO .. either set camera to bulb mode or twist your camera mode dial to manual "M".

Shutter speeds

This can be a subject of long and lengthy discussion; mostly the value based on the picture you want to photograph; it can be any value from 1 second to full 30 second or longer. A long exposure is standard for the firework photography.

ISO

Though you will be shooting into dark sky; it is good idea to have ISO setup as low as possible – 50, 100 or 200.

Lens apertures

As you are turning camera mode dial to "M" you need to set-up aperture and shutter speed. You want to stop down the lens aperture to f/11 or lower. The smaller aperture reduce chances of over exposed or washed out picture if there are multiple bursts; and you get the light streak with well saturated vivid colors.

White Balance

Most of the time auto white balance does the good job. To make sure that you are not surprised with weird color cast in all of you fireworks picture; reset White balance to auto before you start shooting. There are different opinions about the subject. Some say if you are shooting in RAW auto whit balance work well and you can correct later in post-production; other "daylight or tungsten."

Focusing

In this area everyone says focus to infinity. How to do it – In general, there is a distance scale printed on them for this purpose, however, some lenses do not have this scale in that case turn the focus ring clockwise until it stops. Now set the lens to "MF" mode and do not change this until you are done shooting fireworks.

The above camera control options to set up optimum exposure are good beginning points; however, consider some of the Image Control options (**Highlight Tone Priority**, **Long Exposure Noise Reduction**, and **Natural picture Style**) which may affect the image quality.

Last but not least is picture composition - that is, the placement and arrangement of subjects in the image- fireworks is no different. The fireworks pose a challenge here, because there is nothing till fireworks explodes in the sky. My suggestions is watch for first two or three burst and try judge the total area they are taking up and how high fireworks are exploding. Based on your judgment of the fireworks area and type of picture you are planning to capture, decide whether to use wide angle or telephoto lens.

Based on your first two or three shots, consider whether you want to change the orientation to be horizontal or vertical see how much of the frame is filled and which orientation will be effectively fill the subject and background information.

PAINTSHOP PRO – tutorial

You'll want to snap photos, but if you're not careful they may not turn out quite as vibrant as you remembered.

In this tutorial I'm going to light up some firework photos with depth and color by blending multiple layers. Your family and friends will be blown away.

Now, if you've used layers in PaintShop pro, you will already be familiar with how to add and manipulate images in the layers palette..



Just a quick refresher: if you do not see this palette, launch it by clicking the **F8** key on your keyboard.



Once you see this **layers** pallet, we're ready to add a whole new color dimension to our fireworks photos.

Firework photos are dramatic, but if you've shot fireworks from the ground you simply don't have the time to do anything fancy. Usually, I would use the HDR feature on my camera if I wanted to make my photos pop. But fireworks change in a fraction of a second and that's not enough time for this feature to work.

So what I'm going to do instead of creating an **HDR** image by combining the best attributes of multiple exposures, is use one photo with added layers.


Each layer will add depth and color, and then we'll merge them into one spectacular result.

So let's get started. We want to make our fireworks pop!

The first thing you're going to need is the original image you took at the fireworks display.




Next, I'm going to do is go to my layers pallet here, right click on the background and select **Duplicate**. Alternatively, you can select **Duplicate** from the **Layers** menu. Re-name this layer to "Multiply" and I'll set the blend mode for this layer to, you guessed it, **Multiply**.



This isn't necessary but it does help keep things organized.

Next, duplicate the background again, drag it to the top and I'll call this one "Vibrant Blur".


The "Vibrant" name explains it for this layer. You'll want to really increase the photo's color vibrancy. Go to the **Adjust** menu and use **Hue/Saturation/Lightness** or **Vibrancy** from the **Hue and Saturation** menu. You don't need to be shy, I'm using both to give this a real burst of color.



Now go to Adjust, Blur and Gaussian Blur.

The amount of blur needed is really going to depend on the size of the photo so there is no real right or wrong number here so just drag the slider until your image looks like this.

So we have two layers, why not three! I'll duplicate one more copy of the background, name this one **Soft Light** and drag it to the very top of the **Layers** palette.



I'm going to soften the differences between the three layers with the blend mode **Soft Light** to really show off that amazing contrast of light against the black background.

If you find that the image is a little too blurry you can always lower the opacity of that layer by dragging the **Opacity** slider over to the left.

When you have the image the way you would like it you can right click on any one of these layers and select **Merge All Flatten** and then save the image in **JPEG** format.

It's just that easy to make your fireworks photos pop!
